

Data protection – what's changed?

In May 2018, new data protection laws came into force. These have been updated to move in line with rapid changes in technology and strengthen the rights of individuals so they have more control over their information.

At Ysgol Hen Felin we take the handling of information about children, young people and families very seriously. We will tell you what information we collect, the reason why we collect it, and how we use this information.

“Your data is central to your everyday life, so it's important it is used only in ways you would reasonably expect, and that it stays safe”.

Access to Unpublished Information

The Freedom of Information [FOI] ACT 2000 is a general right of access to unpublished information.

We aim to make as much information as possible available and the school will, where possible, consult with you if you are affected by the release of information.

Should you request information under the FOI Act, Ysgol Hen Felin have a duty to confirm or deny whether information is held, and supply the information if it is held within 20 working days [excluding school holiday periods].
